

EXTRA!!! Roof Replacement Begins!



After months of Fund Raising; donations; and Grant Procurement – sufficient funds were identified in late 2010 to proceed with the bid process. Many remember that the roof has had repairs previously paid for by BHSP. Temporary measures were made in an effort to minimize damage to the overall structure. It was evident, that major structural repairs with roof replacement was necessary to dry in buildings.

The Building Committee aggressively pursued an updated architectural and engineer evaluation led by Ken Freidlein of Weinstein-Freidlein Architects. With the information provided the bid process began to take form in early 2011. Contractors were contacted in March; followed by on site visits by contractors who responded prior to bids submission. A Task force of volunteers, comprised of Jimmy Edwards, President; Ken Freidlein, Architect, Larry Boyd, BHSP Member & Retired Contractor with extensive experience in renovating historic properties, and Sandra Harrison, Building Committee Chairman, met with the contractors for bid evaluation. A recommendation for award was reviewed and approved by the Building Committee and the BHSP Board of Directors on May 23, 2011.

Final award of the bid was made on Friday, May 27, 2011 to STOCKS & TAYLOR CONSTRUCTION of Washington, N.C. While the process was time consuming – a well thought out approach was necessary.

Based upon funds currently available, the award covers repairs and replacement of roof in the Auditorium (Northeast Wing); the building connector; and the Office (Northwest Wing).

The plan is to proceed with the Cafeteria (South Wing) as soon as funds are available. The project is prioritized by severity of damage in the buildings. Many thanks for the support of the membership, supporters, and hard work of all committees.

This is a major step forward on the project!

The 2010 BHSP Christmas float was especially upbeat. After a long six year struggle, BHSP took ownership of Bath High School in July. With this as a theme, the float was festooned with faux brick, windows and the new school sign. It was trimmed with flags, the Bath Pirate and school colors maroon and white. Many alumni and local citizens participated as float riders. Float chairperson Marti Buchanan chose BHS alumna Polly Smith Cox (Class of 1936) as float honoree to represent, for the first time, the community owned facility. Parade weather was cold and windy. Mrs. Polly was told we

were in both the Washington and Bath parades, but that she didn't have to do both if it was too much for her. Of course she wanted to! She has so much enthusiasm! Mrs. Polly stated, "BHSP is close to my heart and my heart is close to my ears. And when I hear someone talk about BHSP, I listen!"

Mrs. Cox is dedicated to the cause of upholding the memory of Bath High School and seeing it preserved for the future. At age 90, she was born in 1920, the same year that land was first acquired and construction started on the school. She and her late husband, William E. "Mr. Bill" Cox, both attended. Their five children-Steele, Sandy, Sheila, Jim and Kerry-all went to BHS as did nine of their twelve grandchildren. Now four of their great-grandchildren are at Bath Elementary School with more to come in the fall.

In addition to being students, the Cox family has supported the school in many ways. Mr. Bill served on the Bath School Board. In the spring of 1966, Mrs. Polly returned to BHS as a teacher's aide/tutor and remained for 23 faithful years until her retirement in 1988. Her loyalty and devotion will always be remembered.

Mrs. Cox has purchased two windows: one in memory of her late husband, and another in memory of her brother John Smith and in memory/honor of her class of 1936. She also makes her famous sea foam candy and other goodies for BHSP fundraisers. Son Jim has been active with BHSP since its inception and just completed a term as Director. Son Kerry has been videographer for BHS events and the "oral history project". Other children and family are active supporters and can always be found at BHSP events.

Mrs. Polly was deeply honored to be asked to ride on the float. "I enjoyed myself tremendously!" she said in a recent interview. Truly one out of hundreds that were there from the beginning, Mrs. Polly has always treated everyone with quiet grace, love, and equality. 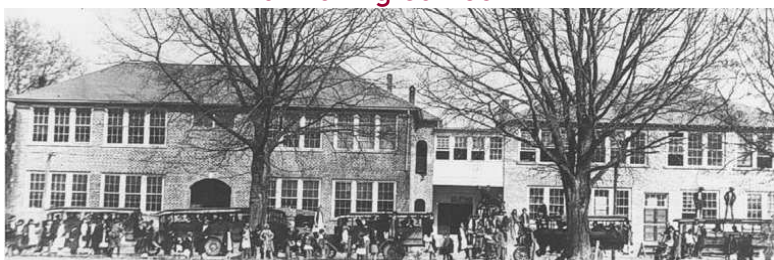

Pride in the Past Faith in the Future

A long time ago a little Indian Village named Panticough lay at peace along what is now our beautiful Pamlico River. Then came some Englishmen from ye olde Bath England and settled along Bath creek by what we now know as Bath, North Carolina. We know that 270 years ago this last March 8th, some of these gentlemen like John Lawson, Joel Martin, Nicholas Daw, Thomas Harding, and John Porter sat at a table probably at Duncan's Tavern on North Main Street in town, and decided to call their beautiful little wilderness, Bath. Maybe there was something about the water and the trees and the land, that reminded them of their home back in England.

Bath grew and went on to produce four colonial governors: Edward Hyde, Thomas Cary, George Burlington, and Samuel Ashe. One of the first things our proud ancestors knew was needed was a church. Saint Thomas still serves the people of Bath as it has for 241 years, built of balast stone from ships arriving from Bath, England. Her bell has tolled services for three years longer than the liberty bell in Philadelphia. A library, early meetings of the state assembly, the first courthouse, and a thriving shipping town soon followed. The first free school in the Colony of North Carolina was established at Bath for the purpose of teaching Indians and Negroes.

Our sister town of Aurora was named for the Tuscarora Indians that lived there. Other surrounding communities also derived their names from Indian tribes. In 1775, 250 years ago, the little town of Fork of the Tar River decided to honor our first president by naming the town, Washington (being known as the original Washington.) Washington was the first town to have a post office named Washington. With this history we have to, we must, carry into the future all our brains, hearts, wills, and faith.

300 years of not so proud exploiting of our beloved east has destroyed much of our beautiful coast all the way from Maine to Virginia Beach and from Key West to Mrytle Beach. On the waters of the Pamlico, Albemarle, and Neuse, remains the only land with really clean, clear water, fish, turtles, clams, crabs, and oysters. Only these rivers support lily pads, cyprus, wild flowers, and the pine woods. You and I must and will be the caretakers of the little of all God gave us. We must carefully, with good planning and withholding some of the greed that is in all of us, build our cities, towns, and vacationlands to serve all.

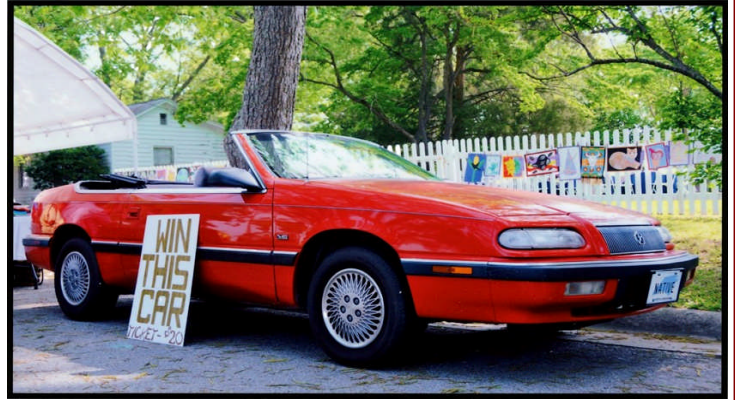
We must be conscientious citizens to save our farms and forests. We must develop job opportunities, non-polluting industries, and businesses that will keep our young people here, or that will get them to return after they go away to college and receive their professional training or learn their skills.
