## Demo complete on old Bath High School

BATH-The kitchen-addition on the old Bath High School was demolished last week taking the Bath High School Preservation Committee a step closer to reaching its goal to return the school to its original façade.

"This is a major step forward in returning this property to community service," said Peggy Daw, president of the Bath High School Preservation Committee.

**Contractor Toby Tetterton** 

completed the demolition.

Bath High School was built in 1921. The kitchen was added to the high school in 1966 to provide a cooking area and serving line.

The kitchen was added after the "period of significance," which ran between 1918-57, Daw said.

"The historic office felt the removal of the kitchen was

okay because it brought back the earlier and much more attractive appearance," Daw said, adding that personnel of the historic office served as consultants during the demolition process. "This keeps our vision of revealing the best architecture features."
